Students with internet access, I ask that you continue reading Romeo and Juliet online and completing your study guide. I will expect to see your completed study guide for us to discuss when we return to school.

Students without internet access, I ask that you complete the following journal prompt assignments:

- 1. Tell me everything you know about Romeo and Juliet to this point. In class, most have read through Act II. If you are not that far along, please explain why.
- 2. "So, open your mouth, lad! For every voice counts!" Describe a situation where it is important NOT to remain silent; but instead to speak your mind and let your voice be heard.
- 3. "Unless someone like you care a whole lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not." Relate this quote to a current situation here at school, in our community, or in our country. Describe the situation and how this quote relates.
- 4. "Sometimes the questions are complicated and the answers are simple." Provide an example for this quote. What is a complicated question that has a simple answer?
- 5. "Fantasy is a necessary ingredient in living." Do you agree or disagree? Explain.
- 6. "Today was good. Today was fun. Tomorrow is another one." What is this quote inferring about tomorrow?
- 7. "It's not about what it is. It's about what it can become." What is the "it" referring to in this quote. Explain.
- 8. "To the world you may be one person; but to one person you may be the world." This quote makes me think about my dad because he's always told me I am his world. What does this quote make you think of?
- 9. "You are you. Now, isn't that pleasant?" Do you believe this? Do you believe that you are unique and that makes you pleasant? Define the word pleasant and then answer the questions.
- 10. "Everything stinks till it's finished." Provide some examples that would apply to this quote in life.
